# Your campsite

## Canvas Wall Tent

These tents are custom-made for us. They're awesome. They'll keep you dry as a bone. Don't lean bags or anything that you don't want to get wet against the canvas. Keep the screen door zipped shut. Bugs are pesky. **No smoking inside the tent and make sure nothing that's on fire gets close to the canvas.** If you're on fire, stop, drop and roll! If you notice any loose stakes, be a pal and hammer them in with a rock or something hard and heavy. Not your bare foot. Ouch.

## Sleeping Arrangements

Generally, you'll have comfortable sleeping for two in the main tent. Some sites have air mattresses and might need some air from time to time. Unzip the liner at the foot of the bed to find the air valve and use the pump provided.

## Tentrr Loo

This baby is elegant in its simplicity. Don't worry. Way less ick factor than you're thinking. The bags were designed by NASA for the space program. They have a secret powder inside that gels around waste and immediately blocks odors. When you're done, tie off the bag and throw it in your trash barrel. Landfill safe. Cool, right?

Before each use, line the bucket with a blue CleanWaste bag.

## Water Carrier

Water is key. For rinsing dishes, washing hands, scotch and water, bird baths, etc. If your water container is empty take it to the designated spot to fill it up. If you don't know where the spot is, ask your CampKeeper.

## Sun Shower

Your solar sun shower can be filled up with potable water, left in the sunshine to warm up and then hung from a tree when you want to scrub up.

## Respect and Safety

- Respect your CampKeeper's site specific rules
- Don't carve your name into anything, and don't cut down trees
- Look out for poison ivy, poison oak, and sumac
- **Check yourself for ticks every 6 hours**

# Heating, stove and campfires

## In-tents Heating

Some sites have a propane heater and some have a wood stove. If you have a wood stove - **do not build a large fire in the stove.** It will damage the stove and get tropically hot in your tent. Small and steady will do the trick. Please use wood provided by the CampKeeper or kiln dried/bought at the store. Do not touch the stove while it's hot. If smoke comes out of the stove and into the tent, open the doors and windows and then turn the pin sticking out of the stove pipe one-quarter turn. The pin controls a flap inside the pipe that acts as a flue.

Never burn softwood in the stove (pine, fir or spruce).

Never leave young ones unattended near the stove or the heater.

## Building a Campfire

Newspaper. Kindling. Wood. That's what gets the party started. Tightly scrunch about 15 newspaper balls and toss them into the center of your fire pit. Arrange a bunch of dry twigs in a square pattern on top of the newspaper. Teepee four logs around the newspaper/kindling. Light the newspaper in several places and blow (a lot) at the base of the fire. (Store-bought fire starters is not cheating).

**Do not leave a fire burning when you are away from camp.**

# Bears and wildlife

## Be Bear Aware

- Don't bring food into your tent
- Keep all food inside a closed vehicle
- Don't sleep in clothes you wore while cooking (or handled any fish or meat)

Food and odors can attract bears. Store food safely and keep campsite clean.

Black bears are not aggressive, but they are around. Don't bother them and they won't bother you.

As for the local wildlife, remember you're in their home. If you're not sure what you should be aware of, ask you CampKeeper. Keep in mind most wildlife is more scared of you than you are of it, so it's best to leave them alone.

- Check campsite for trash, belongings or food
- Carefully pack up the dome tent (if you used it)
- Clean out Tentrr CampBox (take your BBQ sauce!)
- Place (empty) Tentrr Loo inside clean canvas tent
- Zip up all tent windows and doors (clasps, too)
- Take garbage bag(s) to designated trash point (check with your CampKeeper)
- Clean up after your dog
- Clean grill with brush after use
